

Jim Coleman, well-known Somerset golfer and former club champion, has been appointed full-time golf pro for Indian Lake. The appointment became effective April 1.

In this new position, Jim will be responsible for the planning and execution of a co-ordinated golfing program at the Lake. His duties include: management of the Golf Pro Shop, supervision of tournaments, golf lessons, and course regulations.

Information will be distributed through his office on the subjects of tournaments and lessons. This information will periodically appear in the Smoke Signal, be sent in the mail and posted on the bulletin board in the Pro Shop.

Lessons can be arranged by individuals or groups by appointment if they so desire.

TESTIMONIAL SHOOT HONORING EVELYN EPERJESSY HELD AT GUN CLUB

Evelyn Eperjessy, All-America Trap Shooter from Johnstown, Pa., was honored at a week-end testimonial shoot at Indian Lake's Winchester Franchised Public Shooting Center, Saturday, April 30th and Sunday, May 1, 1966.

Mrs. Eperjessy was the Grand American Trap Shooting Champion in 1957 and 1960. For four consecutive years, from 1960 through 1963, Sports Afield Magazine named her All-America Shooter. In her seven year career Mrs. Eperjessy collected 66 trophies. In November 1965 Mrs. Eperjessy was inducted into the Cambria County War Memorial Sports Hall of Fame.

Week-end activities, arranged to include the whole family, began at noon Saturday with a buffet luncheon. At 1:30 there was a fashion show featuring all the latest styles in sportswear and equipment. Following the fashion show, free shooting clinics were given for men, women and children with Mrs. Eperjessy as special guest.

A trap and skeet shooting exhibition was held at 4:00 p.m. The exhibition was performed by internationally famous shooters using the new Winchester Tracer Shells. An open shoot followed the exhibition.

TWO CLASSES FOR THE LAKE

SAILBOATS SELECTED BY RESIDENTS

At a recent meeting, Indian Lake Residents selected two classes of sailing crafts to be eligible for competition in the Lake's sailboat races. One design chosen is of the "Catfish" style with only a single sail. The other craft chosen is of a "sloop" design with a jib sail and a main sail. Both boats are in the 12 foot class.

The catboat selected is the 12½ foot long "Seaflyte", manufactured by the Starcraft Company. This sleek craft is made of fiberglass; it has an 18-foot mast with a sail area of 78 square feet and a beam of 58".

The "Seaflyte" retails for \$475.00. With a purchase of six boats or more there is a substantial discount allowed. There seems to be enough Lot Owners interested to enable Indian Lake to take advantage of the discount.

The Royal Sailboat Company's sloop, the "Buckeye" was selected as the second craft eligible for competition. This boat's overall length is 12' 8"; the beam is 59"; the mast height is 20'; and, the sail area is 101 square feet.

The "Buckeye" is primarily a family-type sailboat. For day sailing, it can carry three adults easily. This craft has good varying ability and can be easily handled by a single individual. Its retail price is \$850.00. If bought in a fleet, a discount of 10% is given.

If the "Buckeye" cannot be delivered within a reasonable time schedule, then, Indian Lake will look to the O'Day Company's sloop, the "Widgeon". This sleek sailboat is 12' 4" in overall length; it has a 60" beam; sail area is 90 square feet; and the mast length is 18' 8". The roomy "Widgeon" holds up to five people and retails for \$950.00. It is possible that the "Widgeon" may become available at the same price as the "Buckeye". If this should occur, then, it may be chosen over "Buckeye."

COME AND SEE

Arrangements have been made to have the "Seaflyte", "Buckeye" and the "Widgeon" on display at Indian Lake,

Sunday, May 1st. There will be demonstrations and rides for those interested in seeing how the crafts handle on the water.

Demonstrations will begin at 10:00 a.m. at Long's Marina and will continue throughout the afternoon. Residents who are interested in obtaining a boat are urged to come prepared to place an order for their favorite boat. The larger the initial order, the greater the savings will be for everyone.

Delivery of the sailboats is scheduled for May 28th. This will enable them to be used over the Memorial Day week-end.
