The water pressure problem experienced earlier in the summer by peninsula residents has been alleviated following mutual efforts taken by new owners of Indian Lake Development Company and Indian Lake Borough Council.

The situation was resolved by developing a new water source and installing additional water storage facilities, thereby increasing both the supply and pressure. Quick action taken by Neilan Engineers at the joint request of Indian Lake officials and Borough Council brought about an early completion of the needed utility improvement.

New Townhouses Looking Good

Six of twelve town houses scheduled for completion prior to ski season in locations near the Lodge parking lot entrance are ready for public showing. The town houses are offered for sale to buyers interested in personal use, investment purposes, or both.

Each of the $1 \frac{1}{2}$ story units now completed has two bedrooms, living room, kitchen and are offered completely furnished. They will accommodate up to eight persons.



Construction progress of the new town house units being erected near the Indian Lake Borough building is shown here. These six $1 \frac{1}{2}$ story units are included in the first phase of the total building program; six additional units, each $2 \frac{1}{2}$ stories, are now under construction opposite these. The larger units will be adjacent to number one fairway on the Executive Golf Course.

Construction on six additional town house units also is underway. These $2 \frac{1}{2}$ story units, each with three bedrooms, living room, kitchen and bath, will accommodate up to ten persons. They, too, will be completely furnished when offered for occupancy.

The Bavarian-style units were designed by Richmond Homes of Richmond, Indiana and erected by the Cambria Construction Company of Johnstown. Sales are handled by Indian Lake Realty, a division of Indian Lake Development Company, with offices on Route 30, two miles west of Reels Corners.

Game Farm Memberships Open

It's that time of year again to clean up old "Betsy", run the dog, and join the gang at the Indian Lake Shooting Park and Game Farm. It's shooting and hunting made simple, convenient and safe under ideal year-round conditions.

In the 1,200 acre game farm you can hunt and shoot pheasant, chuka and quail from September 1 to March 31. In 2,500 acre regulated hunting preserve located east of Route 160 you'll hunt and shoot deer, turkey, rabbit, grouse, woodcock and squirrel during the regular Pennsylvania seasons.

A limited number of memberships to the shooting park and game farm now are being offered. Regular membership, \$150 annually, includes full annual usage of the game farm and shooting park facilities, plus the personal privilege of shooting 20 birds free. (Extra birds being available at \$5 each.) Special membership, \$50 annually, includes the unlimited usage of all facilities with birds being available at \$6 each. Guests will be allowed where space permits at a daily rate of \$10 with birds being available at \$6 each.
